BACHELOR OF THEOLOGY IN COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP (BTh)

OVERVIEW

The programme offers a contemporary approach to studying Theology and Ethics, reflecting on faith, human dignity and social justice in urbanised Africa. Students from different Christian traditions dialogue about historical theological ideas and the challenge of interpreting them in current times. Students learn to value theological thought, but also to respond practically and responsibly to societal issues.

Bachelor of Theology students can customise their majors and courses, keeping their career goals, vocation and interests in mind, to ensure that they're fully equipped for specific professions. A core focus of the BTh programme is an academic grounding in the theological disciplines of Biblical Studies, Practical Theology, and Systematic Public Theology. In addition to this core theological focus, students can choose a further specialisation in Christian Ministry, Psychology or Sociology and Community Development.

MODE OF DELIVERY

*Note that 'Contact Mode' means on-campus studies, and 'Distance Mode' means online studies.

CONTACT MODE

Contact students experience and engage learning at different levels within the classroom. Here students are exposed to lectures presented by passionate, experienced and knowledgeable faculty; group work where the value of learning from peers is amplified; multimedia presentations; role-play; engagement with case studies; and, skills development where students are encouraged to practice certain skills (e.g. communication, presentations, etc.) in the classroom.

ON-LINE MODE

Distance students experience and engage learning at different levels within the virtual learning space enabled by our e-learning platform, called FUNDA. Students are exposed to learning material presented by passionate, experienced and knowledgeable faculty who understand the needs of the distance student. Learning on the e-learning platform takes the form of video lectures, voice-over PowerPoint, readings and discussion forums where student-faculty engagement is facilitated. While learning is primarily self-driven,

students have access to experienced faculty and can draw on their classmates as they navigate their learning. The learning experience is vibrant, stimulating and interactive.

Experiential learning strategies are integrated in the design of modules and can include counselling placements (including interviews with clients, treatment plans, session notes and supervision sessions), psychometric evaluations, quantitative research, self-directed ministry projects, community assessments, focus groups, placements in community projects and envisioning of local community-based initiatives.

All classes and communication with students, staff, and the public are in English, except where otherwise required in modules based on other languages.

Bachelor of Theology in Community Leadership (Minimum 3 years, 360 credits, NQF 7) Modes of delivery: contact and distance

Admission requirements

- A National Senior Certificate (NSC) with a bachelor's pass or equivalent
- A Matriculation Certificate (with university exemption) or equivalent
- A Higher Certificate or Advanced Certificate or Diploma in a cognate field
- National Benchmark Test (NBT) results

Alternative Admission Requirements (with Senate approval as per Admissions Policy)

- A National Senior Certificate or National Certificate Vocational with a diploma pass (or equivalent) combined with the NBT results
- Mature age of 23 and over during the first year of studies and a National Senior Certificate (or equivalent). The conditions of the Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) Policy for access and the results of the NBT are determining factors for admission. Contact the admissions office regarding RPL
- Mature age of 45 years can be admitted, determined by the RPL conditions and the results of the NBT

Applicants in the first category under Alternative Admission Requirements must register for the Extended Programme for Academic Development. The Programme extends the completion of the prescribed subjects over a minimum of four years.

Academic Development concentrates on the skills needed for successful tertiary study. Special attention is paid to listening and reading for comprehension, writing clearly and logically and giving proper credit to sources utilised. Students will develop these essential skills through exposure to readings and talks, and practice these skills in a supportive environment where they will receive detailed feedback.

Students who are admitted on the basis of prior learning and who want to complete the degree in three years, but who fail more than 20% of modules taken during the first semester, are required to take the first year over two years.

Target groups

The Bachelor of Theology (BTh) in Community Leadership aims to provide access for Grade 12 learners to a degree programme equipping them with skills to be more effective leaders in the community in the areas of psychology, church and parachurch leadership and community development. The programme can be taken part-time (maximum 9 years), for those who are only able to pursue part-time studies.

Programme-specific outcomes

BTh students must choose between Christian Ministry, Psychology, Sociology and Community Development, and Media Studies. Each focus has its own specified core and elective modules from the curriculum below. Outcomes are set for each area of focus, as outlined below. Each module within the curriculum also has its own set of outcomes.

BACHELOR OF THEOLOGY IN COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP (CHRISTIAN MINISTRY) (contact and distance) OUTCOMES Christian Ministry students who have completed the qualification must be able to: • Demonstrate the skill to interpret the Bible as an ancient text of different genres and understand the Bible as the written and preached Word of God relevant for today. • Articulate faith expressions of main doctrines and dialogue about convictions relevant to the community. • Demonstrate an understanding of the historical development of faith expressions and doctrines concerning influential figures, biblical texts, and societal changes. • Evaluate various leadership styles, identify personal leadership styles, and identify, develop, and empower leadership potential in others. • Demonstrate effective and spiritual leadership skills, including communication, planning, change and transformation management, resource development, implementation, and evaluation.

- Demonstrate the ability to do independent research to give a particular understanding of vocation considering theological underpinnings, biblical exegesis, personal reflections, and social integration.
- Demonstrate competence in one of the following, depending on the focus area selected:
- 7.1) The knowledge and skills necessary to conduct a Christian ministry, including Word and liturgical ministry, pastoral care, spiritual well-being, and public engagement.
- 7.2) Knowledge of current psycho-social theory and pastoral care theory, and practical skills for counselling and intervention.
- 7.3) Knowledge of social theory, community development, and skills such as cultural awareness and sensitivity to diverse peoples in various communities.

- Understand the competing paradigms of Community Development with a strong emphasis on South Africa
- Demonstrate effective interpersonal communication skills
- Understand the psycho-social problems facing South Africans today, with an emphasis on poverty and poverty alleviation
- · Identify urban and rural issues facing South Africans and understand how to develop community-based initiatives to address them
- Develop a ministry plan, secure the necessary human and fiscal resources, execute the plan and assess the outcomes
- Demonstrate skill in interpreting the Bible and showing its relevance for community development issues in South Africa
- Develop skills that will help them identify Community Development problems and be able to challenge conventional Community Development practices.
